News from around the Circuit

Cotgrave

In the last Circuit News we were just getting over the excitement of reopening the building and now another Methodist New Year is upon us.

We are still getting used to the refurbished building and there are a few jobs around the premises that remain to be done. During the summer we replaced the fence at the rear of the hall and completed the paving on the Lawrence Close side. The garden below the fence has been covered with broken recycled slates, as weed control, as has the circular border on the Bingham Road entrance. Thanks are due to all those who turned out and worked in some extremely hot conditions. We are also grateful to those who provided plants and shrubs.

During September we launched Toddler Café and this has been greatly welcomed by those parents and grandparents who attend. Numbers have proved to be quite promising, to what we see as a valuable form of outreach.

Transform (Year 6 children) began with almost overwhelming numbers of children from both Candleby Lane and Church of England School attending! Numbers at the other activities for youth and children are also quite steady.

We have been successful in attracting some new groups who wish to hire our building on a long term basis. When we were fund raising and applying for grants we stressed that we wanted the premises to be used by the community so this has proved to be a promising start.

During July it was wonderful to welcome the family and friends to the wedding of Sapphire and Josh. This was our first wedding in the refurbished premises. Hopefully we will prove to be an attractive venue for similar events.

Early in September we were privileged to hold the Civic Service for the Mayor of Rushcliffe Councillor Christine, who is a Methodist and a Cotgrave resident. This was followed by a buffet tea. It was good to be able to show off our refurbished premises to our civic leaders as well as those from around Nottingham and Nottinghamshire. We were also able to acknowledge the financial assistance we had received from our local authority.

In my last article I omitted the name of Reverends Andy and Helen from the list of former Ministers. It was good to welcome them both to our opening service.

We are now beginning to think about Advent and Christmas particularly the Christmas Journey for the two primary schools. Exciting if busy times ahead!

The recent Rugby world cup has reminded me of my most thrilling moment playing the sport. Playing for the 2nds against the school 1^{st} XV I was amongst a group of players pushing each other in a maul in the middle of the pitch. And then in front of me I saw the ball. So I picked it up and began to run. No one was expecting this and because it took a while for others to see what was going on, I was out there, running on my own as fast as my legs could carry me towards my moment of glory. I ran half the length of the pitch, but with the try line in front of me I heard the thump of bootsteps behind me, and then I was flattened. It was Gary, an England school boy international, the only one fast enough to catch me and as solid as a brick wall. I didn't quite get to the try line, but I remember the moment, because in a rugby career that was full of a lot of pushing, this was the only moment where I was running free.

In the Message, part of Paul's letter to the Corinthians is translated as 'I don't know about you, but I'm running hard for the finish line. I'm giving it everything that I've got'. It's one of a couple of times in the New Testament where the Christian journey is described as running a race. Hebrews tells us to run with perseverance as we fix our eyes on Jesus. Following Jesus is not always easy. There are times when we feel like a brick wall has landed on us. But alongside these there are also times when there is the exhilaration from the feeling of running free, knowing we are going the way God wants us to go. We face plenty of challenges in this circuit, but I know we are going in the right direction and I see signs that the Holy Spirit is moving in so many different places.

So let's keep on running together, fixing our eyes on Jesus and encouraging each other as we go. I am encouraged by all those great things that go on in this circuit, some of which are described in this circuit news, and I look forward to finding out where God will take us next.

Several members have been trained to offer prayers, if requested, and have debated and reflected on the sensitivities and some of the practical issues when praying for and/or with others. Prayer shawls and crosses are also available. We trust this will enhance the opportunities to deepen faith in our own members and will be available for visitors. Also it is another outreach to people of faith or none whom we are able to offer an additional aspect of worship and service.

Our own Peter was leader of our all age harvest worship service using a well planned variety of methods to reflect on harvest and faith that really enhanced our worship. A collection was made for Framework and gifts of food and dry goods were sent to The Friary. The Stewards thanked everyone for their generous gifts, which this year included unused and surplus tools of all types for Tools with a Mission [TWAM] a Christian charity who collect unwanted tools, refurbish them, and send them to African countries.

We have held several events recently a Charity Card sale and two Keylink events, a Mable's Market and a Team Quiz to support Harvest Help and to attract those on the periphery of our church. In November we have the Bridge Singers in concert.

Preparations are well underway for our Christmas Fair to be held in the Village Hall on 9th November and our Remembrance Sunday service when some members may attend the commemorations around the village memorial gates.

Our Property Committee continue to work to achieve a well-maintained and cared for appearance of our church premises, for both our own church members and those who hire and use the premises throughout the week; of whom there are many. Our premises are in constant use and some redecoration and repair works have been identified, it is hoped to start the work sometime in December

Finally we said goodbye to two of our much loved and faithful members, whom many readers of the Plan will know, Les & Derrick. Les, who reached the age of 101 years, a man of great faith and knowledge of Methodism and Derrick our organist and music maker over several decades. We shall miss them both.
